Health Care Reform and Children with Disabilities

Health care reform has been a topic of discussion both locally and nationally for the past several years, recently leading to passage of the Affordable Health Care Act by the U.S. Congress. The 8th Annual Conference on Health, Disability, and the Law will explore the question of how health reform will impact children with disabilities and their families. Specific presentations by national and regional experts will share the current status of national and state-level health reform activities, including discussion of the impact of health care on families and how we can best advocate for the health care needs of children with disabilities.

Keynote Speaker George Jesien, PhD

George Jesien, PhD, has over 30 years of experience in the developmental disabilities field in various capacities, including school psychologist, project manager, course faculty, and director of state and federally funded programs for children with developmental disabilities and special needs and their families. He has worked in educational agencies, Head Start, university settings and a foundation. Currently he is executive director of the Association of University Centers on Disabilities (AUCD) which represents national networks of Universities Centers conducting research, training and service for and with people with developmental disabilities and their families. He directs a number of cooperative agreements with several federal agencies focusing on research, training and service development for individuals with developmental disabilities, including autism. In this capacity he works with self-advocates, trainees, faculty and directors of over 80 university-based programs and centers throughout the country. He also directs a number of efforts which focus on issues such as disability and health, preprofessional training, disability policy development, national technical assistance, postsecondary education and broad-based collaboration among numerous national disability organizations. Previous positions include serving as the executive director of the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation, director of the Early Intervention Program at the Waisman Center at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and executive director of the Portage Project.

Dr. Jesien was awarded a Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation Public Policy Fellowship to work with the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on Disability Policy working on disability-related legislation. He has served as the president of the National and State Divisions for Early Childhood of the International Council for Exceptional Children and received outstanding service awards at the state and national levels. He has had extensive international experience working on program development and personnel preparation in the United Arab Emirates, Kazakhstan, Peru and other South American countries and in England, China, and India for agencies such as the Soros Foundation, UNICEF and the World Bank. Dr. Jesien received his bachelor's degree from Le Moyne College in English and philosophy and his master's and doctorate degrees from the University of Wisconsin in Madison in school psychology and human development.
